Bill Beacham, Ph.D. is Executive Director of the Center for Drug-Free Communities since 1988, specializing in Treatment of Addictive Disorders and Training in the areas of Drug-Free Schools, Wellness in the Workplace. He is California Board (BBS) Certified.

He is the former Director of Training/Clinical Services for CareUnit Hospitals where he trained addiction specialists, educators, parents, law enforcement and mental health workers in substance abuse prevention and intervention. He specializes in the treatment of adolescents and adults with chemical dependency/psychiatric disorders.

He was a psychologist, teacher and coach in the public schools for 13-years and worked with the National Institute of Mental Health for 4-years in the area of race relations.

Bill is the co-author of the book *What Did You Learn in School Today?* and has contributed to several other books, including the Major League Baseball Player Association's *It's OK to Say No to Drugs* and *It's OK to Say No to Drugs: A Parent Child Manual for the Protection of Children*. He also contributed to *Project Self-Esteem* and the newly released book "That They Might Live". Author of "SAFE" Substance Abuse For Educators Manual.

He has been the keynote speaker at many local, state & national conventions, including the "International Drug and Alcohol Conference", the National Collegiate Athletic Association's (NCAA) "Drugs and Today's Athlete" Conference, the "National Student Assistance Conference" and the "National DARE Officers Association" Conference.

Bill has been a writer/technical advisor for four movies. *One Too Many*, a movie about teenage drinking, aired on ABC. *Shattered: If Your Kid's on Drugs*, a video starring Burt Reynolds. *My Kid's Driving Me Crazy*, a parenting film. The latest movie, *Dare to Care* stars Edward James Olmos. Bill is the creator/presenter of the McGraw-Hill tape series *The Drug-Free Family* and *The Drug-Free Workplace* and developed the "Building Bridges" training program with Dr. David Hawkins & the U.S. Dept. of Education.

Bill is the founder of Peer Assistance Leadership (PAL®) Camp, a 3-5 day peer helping training program for young people. The focus is on peer assistance as it relates to resiliency skills, asset building, violence prevention, conflict resolution, and alcohol, tobacco and other drug prevention/intervention strategies. (4-8 Camps/year since 1985)

He's been with the LAPD/DARE program since its inception in 1983 and the US Olympic Committee. Bill has conducted workshops with many dignitaries including former President Bush, the White House staff and testified at Congressional Hearings.

Biography

At 6 feet 9 inches tall, Officer Jermaine Galloway looks like an intimidating presence, but he is devoted and passionate about education, training, and enforcement when it comes to alcohol and drug use and abuse prevention.

Officer Jermaine Galloway has been an Idaho law enforcement officer since 1997 and has more than 7 years experience in underage drinking, drug and alcohol enforcement. Officer Galloway has worked several different assignments, including: crime scene investigation (CSI), DUI task force, officer mentoring, and as a field training officer. After playing Division One basketball, Jermaine received his BA from the University of San Francisco. Jermaine is currently an adjunct instructor at NNU (Northwest Nazarene University).

Jermaine has coordinated and led hundreds of alcohol related initiatives. Jermaine is also an Idaho POST certified instructor in alcohol beverage laws, community policing and hate & bias crimes. He currently provides nationwide training to police officers, prevention personnel, educators, parents and community coalition members on alcohol and drug trends, party patrols, alcohol over service, compliance checks, party drugs, Fake ID's, drug concealment, alcohol and energy drinks, synthetic drugs, alcohol laws and other community based alcohol initiatives. Galloway also spends much of his time speaking to youth on the harms of underage drinking, drug abuse and tobacco. Each year Jermaine has spent countless hours talking to youth at school assembly's and town hall meetings. Currently, Galloway has trained over 15,000 people nationwide.

Several years ago, Jermaine and his wife created the Northwest Alcohol Conference. This is a nationally recognized conference, which provides training and enforcement strategies to attendees on community alcohol problems. Jermaine has also created several community based alcohol and drug prevention programs.

Jermaine has had articles published in American Police Beat Magazine and many local area newspapers where he has done presentations. Jermaine has also been highlighted in videos and television news media.

He is also a member of the National Liquor Law Enforcement Association (NLLEA) and several local community substance abuse prevention coalitions. In addition, Galloway has presented at several state and nationally recognized conferences including the OJJDP Underage Drinking Conference, Community Anti Drug Coalitions of America Conference (CADCA), TIPS Conference, Youth Crime Watch of America Conference, Alaska Highway Safety Summit, Oregon Highway Safety Summit, Idaho Narcotics Association Conference, Mississippi School State Prevention Conference, and several other statewide conferences.

In 2009, Jermaine received the National Law Enforcement Partner of the year award from (OJJDP) Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention.

In 2010, Jermaine received the National Mickey Sadaoff Underage Drinking Award from the director of (MADD) Mothers Against Drunk Driving (see below).



Donna Rice Hughes, President and CEO



Donna Rice Hughes, President and Chairman of **Enough Is EnoughSM** (EIE), is an internationally known Internet safety expert, author, and speaker. As a respected leader of national efforts to protect children online, Donna has championed EIE's mission to make the Internet safer for children and families since 1994. Under her leadership and vision, EIE created the Internet Safety 101SM program with the U.S. Department of Justice and other partners. She is also the executive producer, host, and instructor of the Internet Safety 101SM DVD series, the cornerstone element of the 101SM program.

Donna is frequently sought out by educators, policy makers, law enforcement officials, and industry leaders for her Internet safety expertise, and she has been a featured guest and Internet safety expert on leading national broadcasts including Dateline, The Today Show, The O'Reilly Factor, Oprah and 20/20. Donna has given more than 3,500 media interviews and has been a regular commentator on Internet safety issues on CNN, Fox News, and MSNBC. Her views and editorials have been featured in The Wall Street Journal, The New York Times, The Washington Post, USA Today, The San Francisco Chronicle, The San Jose Mercury News, The Los Angeles Times, The Philadelphia Inquirer, People magazine, and McCall's magazine. Donna was described as "one of the leaders in the fight against pornography aimed at children" by Oprah Winfrey, and applauded as a pioneer on Internet safety, "helping all of us build a medium we can be proud of," by Steve Case, founder of America Online.

She co-wrote the story for the May 2000 season finale episode of Touched By An Angel that brought the message of Internet dangers and online safety to prime time television and won the Nielsen ratings for its time slot during the May sweeps period. Her book, Kids Online: Protecting Your Children In Cyberspace (Revell, September 1998), was heralded worldwide and has been translated into Spanish and Korean.

Donna has spoken extensively on the subject of Internet safety in educational and professional forums nationwide, offering her expert advice to parents, legislators, law enforcement officials, and industry leaders on ways to protect vulnerable children. Donna has testified numerous times before the United States Congress on Internet dangers and safety solutions. Her seminar at the Department of Justice's Federal Prosecutors' Obscenity Symposium was applauded as a "highlight" of the 2002 meeting by Andrew Oosterbaan, chief of the Child Exploitation and Obscenity Section, where Donna served as the Department's only non-lawyer/non-law enforcement instructor.

Donna was appointed by Senator Trent Lott to serve on the Child Online Protection Act (COPA, 1998) Commission and served as co-chair of the COPA Hearings on filtering/ratings/labeling technologies. She also serves on various Internet safety advisory boards and task forces including the 2006 Virginia Attorney General's Youth Internet Safety Task Force and the 2008 Internet Safety Technical Task Force, formed with MySpace and the U.S. Attorneys General. Donna has received numerous awards including the National Law Center for Children and Families Annual Appreciation Award, and the "Protector of Children Award" and Media Impact Award from the National Abstinence Clearinghouse.

Donna received a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of South Carolina and graduated Magna Cum Laude and Phi Beta Kappa. She is married to Jack Hughes and has two grown step-children, Sean and Mindy, and a grandson, Alexander Briggs.
